THE MI SAFE PATIENT CARE ACT

Don't hospitals need flexibility in their staffing? Under the law, hospitals could adjust the ratios to increase nursing care if patient needs require What they would lose is the ability to understaff and overwork nurses whenever they want It is reasonable for government to set a minimum standard in hospitals, where public safety is at risk

Department of Health and Human Services

(34 hospitals) indicated that they rely on incident reporting systems to capture a large portion of the information about events that they use to conduct patient safety improvement activities The administrators acknowledged that incident reporting systems provide incomplete information about how often events occur, but they continue to rely on

Physician-owned specialty hospitals

340B Hospital Community Benefit Analysis

exempt hospitals demonstrate accountability to the communities they serve by filing a report on the benefits they provide to their community using the IRS Form 990 Schedule H and making it publicly available In 2016, tax-exempt hospitals participating in the 340B drug savings program provided \$561B in total benefits to their communities

Medicare Does Not Pay Acute-Care Hospitals for Outpatient ...

Connecticut Hospital Regulation

and other special hospitals Certain hospitals are excluded, such as psychiatric hospitals or hospitals not accessible to the general public (eg, prison hospitals or college infirmaries) In Connecticut and most other northeastern states, the vast majority of hospitals are nonprofit (Connecticut currently has three for-profit acute care
